North and South

prominence in the years following World War II, do not fit easily into the main currents of 20th Century poetry. The title comes from Elizabeth Bishop's first book *North and South* (1946). The idea is lightly related to the poets Elizabeth spent much of her life in South America, whereas Lowell was a quintessential New Englander.
