Crime and Punishment in Medieval England c1000-1500—Norman Conquest Norman kings believed that any crime was an insult to the king's peace Therefore, the system of wergild ended and was replaced by punishments that were designed to emphasise the power of the king, rather than to give compensation to the victim

What was life like in medieval London? London changed a lot during the medieval period From the 600s to 800s London was located in the west, where Covent Garden is today At the end of the 800s people moved back into the old Roman town due to increased Viking raids The old town had the remains of a wall around it and people felt safer there
